




Preparing an illustration


I was able to create a website called Toffee Town to celebrate the history of this local company and as well as this I wrote and illustrated a book for school children.

Parts of the story weren't documented at the time so I had to use my imagination



















From the Queens Road factory I sketched an outline then took separate geometric shapes to recreate it.



Then, to create a logo, I took the shape of top of the building to make






Then came the planning of the front and back cover.
